Departmental advice for maintained schools from the Department of Education (November 2014) states that:

"All maintained schools must meet the requirements set out in section 78 of the Education Act 2002 and promote the spiritual, moral, social and cultural (SMSC) development of their pupils. Through ensuring pupils' SMSC development, schools can also demonstrate they are actively promoting fundamental British values.

Schools should promote the fundamental British values of **democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty, and mutual respect and tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs**.

Actively promoting the values means challenging opinions or behaviours in school that are contrary to fundamental British values" Promoting British Values and the Prevent Duty At Rosegrove Infant School we provide a safe learning environment where children learn democracy, tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs, mutual respect, individual liberty and the rule of law. Schools have a legal duty to prevent young people from being drawn to terrorism. This duty is known as 'The Prevent Duty' for schools. All our staff have completed online Prevent training.
